The Bhakra-Nangal Complex represents a remarkable achievement for India post-independence. Despite its long existence, the complex lacked a higher education institution until 1979 when the college was finally established at Naya Nangal. Situated on a picturesque 16.5-acre campus along the right bank of the Satluj River, about 2.5 km from Nangal Dam, the college was taken over by the Punjab government on May 12, 1997. The campus includes three three-storeyed Teaching Blocks, a Library-cum-Administrative Block, a students' Center, a Sports Complex, and a Cycle Stand. It is affiliated with Punjabi University, Patiala.

The college is running five undergraduate and four postgraduate programmes. The college boasts modern facilities, including fully equipped laboratories, a well-stocked library, and computer labs with broadband internet and LAN connectivity and well maintained spacious grounds for sports. The dedicated faculty with 16 Ph.D. holders / NET and 06 M. Phils, is supported by an efficient administrative and technical staff. The college has successfully introduced various certificate courses and programs, catering to areas such as digital marketing, musbroom cultivation, and computer-
	marketing, mushroom cultivation, and computer- aided accounting. The institution boasts ample
	infrastructure to support these offerings effectively.

	An exceptional feature of the curriculum is that arts and commerce students can delve into science subjects, while science students are afforded the opportunity to explore arts and soft skills. The pedagogical strategy accentuates communication, discussions, debates, and research, fostering multidisciplinary thinking. Despite adhering to the prescribed university curriculum, as a government- affiliated college, Government Shivalik College endeavors to go beyond. Notably, subjects like environmental and road safety, as well as drug abuse awareness, have been incorporated into the undergraduate syllabus. The college orchestrates an array of initiatives including NCC, NSS, Buddy groups, Dapo program, Eco club, Red Cross, and Red Ribbon club. These avenues contribute to nurturing environmental consciousness, community engagement, and a spirit of service among students. The college dutifully adheres to the guidelines set forth by the state of Punjab and its affiliating institution, Punjabi University, Patiala. The alignment with the directives of the Directorate of Higher Education, Punjab, and the affiliating university is steadfast and unwavering. Moreover, in consonance with the National Education Policy (NEP) of 2020, the institution has been proactive in fostering a multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approach. It offers short-term certificate courses in Computer-Aided Accounting, Digital Marketing, and Mushroom Cultivation. Additionally, Bajaj Finserv Ltd. collaborates with the college to deliver a certificate program in Banking, Finance, and Insurance. These ventures are geared towards equipping students with essential life skills and enhancing their prospects in the job market.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Even when the ABC system has not been implemented by the affiliating university, the college has shown its readiness by asking its students to register and open an ABC account. Most of the students have registered and opened their ABC account. However, the Directorate of Higher Education, Punjab and the affiliating university will take the decision in regard of implementing of it. The ABC will be implemented when they take the final decision.
3. Skill development:	The college is dedicated to implementing innovative and sustainable measures that enable students to

	recognize their inherent talents, project their potential, and channel these attributes toward developing essential skills. This preparation equips them to forge a secure and progressive future for themselves and society as a whole. The postgraduate programs offered by the affiliating university are integrated into the college's curriculum, all adhering to the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS). Recognizing the importance of student employability, the institution administers certificate courses focused on skill development. These skill courses, including Computer-Aided Accounting, Digital Marketing, and Mushroom Cultivation, are conducted under the CBCS framework, as designed by the affiliating university, JGNOU. A harmonious synergy between skill development and industry demands is crucial, as well as integrating vocational education with mainstream education. Addressing this, the college has established a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Bajaj Finserv Limited. This partnership facilitates a 100-hour Certificate Programme in Banking, Finance, and Insurance through the institution's career and counseling cell. In its pursuit of furnishing students with value-based education, the college leverages various units such as NSS, NCC, Red Cross cell, and Legal Literacy cell. These units conduct training sessions, workshops, seminars, and more. Beyond the prescribed syllabus, the college has cultivated an environment that offers students a broader platform for self-development.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	Our institution acknowledges the rich and diverse Indian heritage and traditions with the sole aim to inspire in-depth spiritual, intellectual inquisitiveness as well as to facilitate the learners. The College teaching process is carried out is carried out using Indian languages like Hindi, mother tongue Punjabi as well as English. Significant stress is given on promoting the use of Indian Languages through competitions and activities that are specifically conducted in this regard Significant stress is given on promoting the use of Indian Languages Under Ek Bharat Shresht Bharat programme through competitions and activities that are specifically conducted in this regard like celebration of Punjabi Mah, Hindi day celebration. The college strives on a daily basis to create a youth who upholds the Indian culture by inculcating sound values, compassion for

	all despite caste and creed and an understanding of humanity. Units like NSS, NCC and various clubs organize programmes and ensure the active participation of students in all activities like – Yoga, Voters day, Blood Donation camp etc. Value enrichment programmes are conducted regularly to instil our youth with morals that will bring glory to our Nation.
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	The curriculum is delivered in a way that focuses on student centric model that maps and measures students' performance at every step. Teachers are focused on helping students develop new skills by encouraging them to participate in various co- curricular as well as extra - curricular activities, enriching way of learning by arranging and conducting guest lectures seminars, tutorials/workshop/practical and project based learning field work, technology enabled learning. Question papers are prepared based on Outcomes expected from the students. The institution follows the guidelines of the university regarding outcome based Education.
6. Distance education/online education:	The pandemic scenario during Covid – 19 saw the evolution of the education sector. The institution regularly tries to integrate these cross-cutting social issues to the curriculum by periodically organizing seminars/ workshops having bearing on Gender Equality, Environment and Sustainability, Human/ Moral Values. Many courses in the programmes are linked directly or indirectly with the cross cutting issues.

Gender Sensitization: The general atmosphere of our college, with equal opportunity to boys and girls in many courses, provides an enabling environment for gender equality. The college ensures equal ease of access to resources and opportunities regardless of gender, including economic participation and decision making; and the state of valuing different behaviors, aspirations and needs equally, regardless of gender.Extension lectures are organized to create awareness about Gender issues like basic female health/ hygiene , female foeticide . Self defence workshops for girls are conducted.

Environmental and sustainability: A qualifying and mandatory paper entitled "Environmental and Road Safety awareness" is mandatory for all the streams of undergraduate levels. This paper covers topics such as Renewable and Non Renewable resources, Environmental Pollution and its effects, Social issues, Environmental laws and Road Safety awareness. Eco Club of the college organises competitions, Tree plantation etc. to create awareness about the need to among the students

Human values: Human Values are the most precious of all values. The college also recognizes the importance of value based education. The B.A. curriculum for example includes various issues on human values like justice, Equality, liberty and rights, caste issues, rights and duties, social responsibility, child rights etc. A qualifying and mandatory course "Drug Abuse Problem , Managment and Prevention" is already introduced in the undergraduate curriculum of all streams. This course educates the students about various drugs and their ill effects on the human system. Students and In charge of NSS unit also visit nearby villages under the DAPO programme and educate the villagers about ill effects of drugs, carry out Anti- Drug campaign, Campaign against Stubble burning, blood donation. Pledge against use of various kinds of intoxication during these visits. UG common course for English and Punjabi for all classes and course for Hindihave numerous stories and poems that focus on human values.

- A qualifying and mandatory paper entitled "Drug Abuse: Problem, Managementand Prevention" is mandatory for all the streams of undergraduate levels through which students are educated about the ill effects of drugs. Buddy program is also another program started by the Punjab Government to facilitate the students to help overcome / gain knowledge about ill effects of various kinds of intoxication/ drugs.

- NSS Units nurture a spirit of social service and a sense of fellow feeling among the students.
- NCC Imparts military training and inculcates a sense of discipline in life.

- The college being affiliated to Punjabi University, Patiala coheres to the syllabus prescribed by the University. In the beginning of the session, orientation program is conducted to familiarize students with the courses and components of internal assessment.

- Schedule of Sessional Examination and assignment is given in Academic calendar (in prospectus and on college website) which is displayed well in advance before commencement of session.
- The Registrar of the college and his team constantly strive to achieve sufficient transparency and accountability in examination system and also to maintain uniformity in all aspects of examinations i.e.question papers,award list, duties assigned etc. This committee takes care of all exam-related issues vis a vis the announcement of dates and the date sheet/ schedule of the mid semester examination, smooth conduct of exams, timely evaluation of answer booklets, finalization of and entry/ uploading them on the college website.
- Marks distribution for internal assessment varies from one department to another and also for differen tsubjects. However, the criteria employed for assigning marks for internal assessment is based on many parameters such as sessional test marks, assignments, class participation (group discussion, seminar, workshop, and competitions), behavior and attendance. The marks obtained by the students in internal assessment test are uploaded periodically on the university web portal.
- Mid-Sessional tests are centralized. Teachers prepare question papers according to the syllabus covered in the class of each course and submit it to the Registrar examination office. The Registrar office is completely responsible for getting the paper printed/ photoststed. After evaluation, answer booklets are shown to students and answers are also discussed with students. Students check the marks given to their answers in the answer booklets If the student has any query regarding their answer to any question or is dissatisfied with the marks given to any question in his/her answer sheet is addressed at the same time. providing sufficient transparency and accountability. After each mid semester examination, marks are also uploaded on the college website.

Our institute has organised a workshop on NEP(New Education Policy) by Dr. G.S.Chatta for faculty members, so that they can fully aware about the new changes in education system. Many of the faculty members have successfully completed Professional development program on" Implementation of NEP - 2020" for university and college teachers by Ignou, New Delhi Seminars on Intellectual property right, Digital marketing, Research methodology, Enterpreneurship were organised by people from the industry and intellectuals to motivate and empower the students. Our college has signed a MOU (memorandum of understanding) with a company Bajaj finserv Ltd. which empowers the students by undertaking a six month certificate programme in the field of Banking, Finance and Insurance.

Along with this our faculty members have attended National and International Conferences,

have presented and published papers in Conference proceedings. One faculty member has recently completed her Ph.D and nine members are pursuing their Ph. D's in their designated fields. A few faculty members have published research papers in National and International (UGC - Care) Journalse. Books have also been published by a few faculty members.

Our institute has offered a new kind of flexibility to the students through blended mode of learning. During covid and post covid period knowledge was and successfully imparted to the students of our institute through E-Learning modules.By using innovative methods like online PPT's, notes had been given to the students in their google classrooms. Moreover, You tube links related to the topics in the syllabus had been shared during covid period by their subject teachers so that they could able clear their concepts and increase their knowledge. Powerpoint presentations of various topics of different courses have been uploaded on the college website so that the students can access them at anytime from anywhere.

Enterpreneurship Development Club has been started in the college to identify and inspire enterpreneurship among the students. Under the ageis of this club, students of Commerce department set up food and games stall during the Annual Athletic Meet.

Department of Botany guided the students on the process of extraction of plant parts for the preparation of Herbal colours . The students showed what they had learned enthusiatically prepared herbal colours for the science fair, Thus creating an environment and oppurtunity for enterpreneurship.

Department of Chemistry guided the students on the scheme of preparation of Herbal items, Bio- plastics and Rayon fibre i.e the ingriedients / chemicals required, their ratio, temperature and other conditions to be maintained. The students demonstrated the knowledge gained by them by preparing them. The main motto of the department is to inculcatescientific attitude and enterpreneurship ability in students.

Indian Knowledge system is an innovative method based on the traditional / indigenous/ regional/cultural practices, crafts skills etc. Our college has been organising yoga workshop every year on 21 June in which students and the faculty both learn about different yoga postures and benefits of yoga to humans under the supervision of Yoga experts from the department of Ayush .Our Punjabi department is guiding the students regarding punjabi language through various activities like debate, essay writing competitions on mother tongue.

3.4 Extension Activities

3.4.1

Govt. Shivalik College Naya Nangal encourages faculty, students for regular engagement with neighborhood community, NGOs and welfare organizations for their holistic and sustainable development through various activities. NCC Unit: NCC Naval wing exists in our college. The NCC students take part every year in the Independence day and Republic day parade. They actively participate in all college/ community activities organised by various societies and clubs. Seeing the Naval wing cadets in their white uniform instills a feeling of Patriotism and creates a sense of responsibility towards our nation. The following tasks have been done: drill, weapon training, adventure training, yoga, physical training, youth exchange programme, etc.

Legal Literacy Cell: Under this students are sensitized about environment, health and other important issues concerning society. Seminars/ Quiz competition/ poster making on Ill effects of bursting crackers, consumption of tobacco, drugs and its bad effect. On International Non Violence day declamation contest was held.

Red Cross Society: The society is pro- actively working to sensitize the students towards giving back to the community by serving their needs. Blood donation camp was organised along with awareness rally on the importance of Blood Donation. Red cross society of the college in collaboration with Red Cross Society, Rupnagar trained students as first aid volunteers for the Red cross posts set up to serve the masses during the religious festival of the Sikh community " Holla Mohalla" in the month of March 2023. 30 students of the college served as Red Cross volunteers. The college staff and students also donated Rs. 7000/- in favour of Red Cross Society, Rupnagar.

The Govt. Shivalik College in Naya Nangal was founded in 1979. The total campus area comprises of 16.71 acres. The college serves as a beacon of hope and upliftment for a largely socio-economically backward student group. The college provides sufficient infrastructure to nurture the academic interest of students and ensures optimum facilities for the curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities.

MAIN ADMINISTRATIVE BLOCK :The Administrative Block houses the office of the Principal, ,Registrar , Bursar/ IQAC/ RUSA Co-ordinator , Administrative office, a girls common room, the faculty staff room on the ground floor and the college library on the first floor. The administrative office is fully automated and uses a CMS office automation software. The

CLASSROOMS: The college has a total of 31 well ventilated and spacious classrooms furnished with adequate lighting, fans and furniture.

LECTURE THEATRES: There are 16 lecture theatres in the college distributed in arts , science and HEIS block.

LABORATORIES: There are well-equipped laboratories for Botany, Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Geography, Two computer labs for BCA/PGDCA, two computer labs for B.A/B.Sc (computer science) and a dedicated english lav.all linked to a high speed wifi network. Laboratories are provided with requisite equipment for the conduct of practicals.

GARDENS: College has a well maintained Botanical and Herbal garden for learning and practical purposes.

MUSEUMS: The college boasts of one of its kind Zoological museum as well as Botanical museum.nd boys are also present

CANTEEN: The college has a well maintained canteen It includes a well-ventilated open kitchen for preparation of various food items, There is a separate sitting area for staff and students.

Washroom facility: Floor wise separate washrooms facility for Boys and Girls is available in the college. Incinerators and vending machines has been installed in girl's washrooms.

Facilities for specially abled: College provides wheelchair for specially abled students and have ramps on ground floor for the same. Disabled washroom for Girls is there. Wheel chair facility is also available in the college

Multipurpose hall and carreer counseling room: The Multi purpose hall on the second floor of the arts block has a seating capacity of 150 students. There is also a career guidance and counseling cell at the college.

Sports facilities: College offers substantial sport facilities to its students vis - a - vis Outdoor game facilities like Badminton, football, cricket, volleyball, basketball, kabbaddi, athletics and other track /field events as well as an indoor gym. The college also has open air stage to host various cultural and performance activities.

ICT enabled Facilities: The college has adequate ICT infrastructure. There are 14 Interactive panels disributed in classrooms, lecture theatre, labs, library and principal office. Three seminar rooms have Digital podium, OHP and White Boards. 112 computers are distributed among different computer labs, english lab, library, office, departments. Electronic Kiosk is also there . The college has 7 fiber-based WiFi facilities, and the internet connection is regularly updated.

- **Operating System and Software:** Library computers are equipped with Windows 10, and Microsoft Office 2016 is installed, allowing users to work on essential office applications such as Word, Excel, and PowerPoint.
- Antivirus Protection: To ensure the security of its computer systems and safeguard against potential threats, the library has Quick Heal Antivirus software installed on its computers.
- **Battery Back-Up:** Recognizing the importance of data preservation, the library has installed a battery back-up system with a capacity of 6KV for its computers. This ensures data integrity and uninterrupted services during power disruptions.
- Working Hours: The library welcomes all undergraduate (U.G.) and postgraduate (P.G.) students from 9:00 AM to 4:00 PM, providing them with ample access to its resources. The staff and faculty also have access to the library during these hours.
- **Digital Resources:** The library offers teachers and students access to valuable digital resources through platforms like INFLIBNET and N-LIST. Coming to the non-teaching staff, the clerks, record keeper, the Office Subordinate are some of the employees who manage the office work like salaries, day to day office work, university work etc. They

also correspond with higher authorities. The watchmen, gardeners and safai sewaks look after the cleanliness of the campus.

For effective functioning of the college, various committees with one faculty member as convenor and 2-3 lectures as members are formulated at the begining of the session. These committees ensure that all the work related to academics, co-curricular and extracurricular activities as well as the augmentation and maintenance of infrastructure/ facilities runs smoothly.

Govrernment Shivalik College, Naya Nangal functions under the supervision of the State Government as well as the Office of the DHE (Directorate of Higher Education, Punjab). The guidelines and instructions framed by both are followed by the college. The funds to pay for salaries, maintenance, building infrastructure etc.is acquired from them. The appointment of the teaching / non teaching faculty is the prerogative of Punjab Government only. The college has to adhere to the service rules and procedures of the Punjab government in totality.

It covers all the details of the teacher with regard to courses engaged, curricular, co-curricular and extra curricular duties performed, research/ faculty development program/ conferences/workshops attended , Use of participatory and innovative methodologies and submit it to the office of the Principal.

APPRAISAL OF NON-TEACHING STAFF

The performance of the non-teaching staff (till Class III employees) is done on the same parameter as the teaching faculty. The Class IV non teaching staff of the college is assessed on the basis of the self-appraisal form they fill annually on the requisite form provided by the Directorate of Higher education. The superintendent appraises the Class IV employees followed by review of the appraisal by the Principal

On the basis of the self appraisal form filled, the Principal writes the confidential reports of the teaching and non- teaching faculty as per the parameters given in the Annual Appraisal performa. The Annual Confidential reports of the teaching and non- teaching (upto class III employees) Faculty is sent to the Directorate of Higher Education for Review.

This includes obtaining quotations from the market, floating tenders through the Government e-Marketplace (GeM) portal, or purchasing equipment at the approved rates of the Directorate General of Supplies and Disposals (DGS & D).

The college Bursar actively monitors the entire financial process and assists the College Principal in efficiently utilizing financial resources. Detailed records are maintained daily by the relevant authorities and committees, including invoices, to ensure compliance with financial guidelines.

Internal and External Audits:

1. **Internal Audit:** The college conducts regular internal audits of all students' funds. These audits are carried out by the college Bursar to verify the proper usage of funds and adherence to

financial protocols.

- 2. External Audit: External audits are conducted for all government grants and other funds. The Auditor of the Accountant General (AG) Punjab performs these audits. The last audit took place in 2015. As a government institution, the college takes all the suggestions and objections raised by the auditors seriously and ensures full compliance with their recommendations.
- 3.**PTA, HEIS, and RUSA Fund Audits:** The college arranges independent audits for the PTA, HEIS, and RUSA funds. These audits are conducted by authorized Chartered Accountants, providing an additional layer of scrutiny and financial transparency.

By upholding these well-established financial monitoring and audit mechanisms, our college demonstrates its commitment to maintaining financial discipline and accountability. The college is very much conscious of the sensitivities involved in gender-related issues and is committed to ensure a safe and secure environment for girls . Over the past five years, several measures and initiatives have been undertaken to promote gender equity and empowerment of women. Student Grievance Committee of Government Shivalik College Naya Nangal has a ZERO tolerance policy against sexual harassment. The committee has been following due protocol in redress of complaints and worked proactively towards increasing gender sensitization by organizing lectures, seminars and self defence classes. It has also sought periodic feedback from students and is committed to ensuring a safe environment for girls within the college. A proactive Gender Sensitization, Prevention of Sexual Harrasment and Student welfare committee has organized various competitions and events to raise awareness of Women's issues in the past five years. Poster making competitions, and Essay writing competition were organized every year along with a legal awareness program on women's rights. However, since students are sensitized enough towards women safety aspects, there have been no complaints of sexual harassment or any ragging related issues and other safety related issues during the last five years.

a) SAFETY AND SECURITY: Safety and security of the girl students and female teachers is of utmost Importance and is the fundamental duty of the college administration. In case of any emergency, with any untoward incidents the Principal as the head of the institution can call the Police and sort them out. However, since students are sensitized enough towards women safety aspects, there have been no complaints of sexual harassment or any ragging related issues and other safety related issues during the last five years. Keeping the safety of the students in mind, the administration has installed **Hi-Tech Surveillance System** with 32 high-resolution cameras along with day/night facility of distributed recording at various strategic points in the campus. Such Hi-Tech surveillance system ensures that all female staff and students can move freely and feel assured that they are secure at all the time in the campus. All students wear their id cards at all times on the campus, thus ensuring non-entry of any outsider.

b) COUNSELING:

Bringing awareness through education about the issues associated with gender is the best way to bring about change in the present male-dominated patriarchal society. College has setup tutorial classes for all

the male and female students for mentoring and value inculcation regarding social, moral and ethical values along with gender awareness etc. Mentors have been appointed for a group of around 30-40 students, The boys and girls can meet the Principal and other senior staff members for solving their problems any time without any appointment.

c) COMMON ROOM:

In administrative block of the college, separate girls common room is available. The room have facilities like First Aid box, Girls toilets, sanitary napkin vending machine, bed for rest. The college ensures to provide quality sanitary napkins for girl students through all sanitary napkin vending machine installed in Girls washroom. Sanitary napkin incinerators are also installed in the girls wishroom for safe and environment-friendly disposal of used napkins.

Such students are identified by the faculty members and then books are issued to these students. Faculty members make sure that books once issued must be deposited back by the students after exams.
